The theme seeks to convert and develop the latent qualities and abilities of members to present and future success and usefulness.

Her the Future Leader

We recognize that leadership is not about power but shared journey that empowers us to work together and bring positive change to our lives, the lives of others and the wider society. We deliver our mandate to empower the girl child through high quality non-formal educational programmes. These provide the girls and young women with dynamic, flexible and value-based training in life skills, playing a unique role in creating a world where girls and young women are valued and empowered to take action to change the world.

This pillar drove a very strategic recruitment drive in Rift Valley in 2021 that has seen the membership in this period grow by an impressive 50% to the current 350,000 girls. We intend to scale this strategy to other regions as we work towards 1,000,000 members in the next two years.





HER the Entrepreneur

The KGGA continues to work toward elevating the entrepreneurial and financial management skills of girls and young women that to build their economic empowerment and independence. policy makers. One key driver of this is broadening partnerships with like-minded institutions and individuals in order to establish a 'Centre of Excellence' at KGGA headquarters.

The deliverables of this endeavour are training on Entrepreneurship and life skills, business mentorship, linkage to Business finance and E-commerce opportunities.

HER the Green Ambassador

KGGA recognizes the need, relevance, and importance of environmental conservation. The initiatives around this range from tree planting and plastic waste management awareness include working with local groups to participating in forest restoration around the five highland forests and championing agroforestry. The flagship project under this pillar is the "One Girl One Tree Campaign".





HER the Peacemaker

Peacebuilding is at the heart of Girl Guiding and embedded within the Guide Promise and Guide Law. The clarion call is to "Stand Up, Stand Strong, and Stand together for peace". KGGA has carried out peace education activities that will promote conflict resolution, participated in Stop-Gender Based Violence' Campaigns and trained Peace Ambassadors from various counties who in turn will spread the message of peace in their immediate environments.

HER the Life Giver

Donating blood and saving lives is in line with our mandate to serve God and country and in obedience to the guide's law of "doing a good turn every day". It is our persuasion that a blood donor is a natural resource, and we advocate that voluntary blood donation be encouraged as a civic duty. KGGA launched an ambitious KGGA @100 Countrywide blood donation drive targeted to raise 100,000 blood Units.

There have been several blood drives in this regard with the first one being conducted at the Centenary celebrations launch in Feb 2021.



DOCUMENTING THE JOURNEY

KGGA@100 Documentary & Coffee Table

The Association chose to document the 100 - year journey through a Documentary and a Coffee table Book.

This was developed through interviewing more than 30 people and the collection of more than 30 hours of raw footage. The interviews happened in Nairobi, Nyeri and Mombasa. Apart from the individual interviews, the stories of Shanzu transitional workshop for the disabled women, Hawkers market Centre, Kibera girls center and PAXTU in Nyeri were also captured.

The final productions included;

- i. 1 Main documentary that is 1 hour 7 minutes long.
- ii. 1 Short documentary that is 23 Minutes long
- iii. A 6-minute documentary that was shown during the main event on 25th February 2022
- iv. 5 trailers used to tease the main documentary on social media.






Fig: Coffee Table Book

Day 1:

In her remarks the Chief Commissioner stated that the Tamasha @100 camp was part of the Centenary Celebrations and as KGGA celebrated 100 years of Guiding the movement should continue growing in the counties. The Chief Commissioner recognized and awarded the oldest and the youngest Guide present in the camp as a sign that Guiding is for the young and old; the oldest was one of the KGGA Trainers Esther Chomba (67 years) and youngest was brownie from Aberdare Ranges primary school(7 years).

The Chief Commissioner ended her remarks by declaring that the Tamasha@100 camp was officially opened and encouraged the team to have fun as they prepared to attend the Centenary celebrations at CITAM Karen the day after.

WORLD THINKING DAY 2022 AT THE BADEN POWELL GROUNDS AND MUSEUM (PAXTU)

Since it was first launched, World Thinking Day has become a way to support Girl Guiding and Girl Scouts across the globe. It allows groups of Girl Guides and Scouts to get to know and connect with others within the Girl Guiding and Scouting community, even if they're situated countries apart.

World Thinking Day aims to bring together young people from across the world – nearly 150 countries choose to take part in the celebrations – to celebrate international fun and friendship, as well as to help raise money and focus on the year's global theme. The theme for 2022 was 'Our World, Our Equal Future.' The Environment and Gender Equality. The theme marks the start of a three-year plan to make the members more environment conscious.

KGGA however continued with its focus on the Centenary Celebrations and the theme thereof, 'Awakening Her Potential.'

On 22nd February 2022 The National Council Members led by the KGGA chief Commissioner Prof Faith Nguru left Nairobi for Nyeri for the commemoration of WTD/ Founders day celebrations at the Baden Powell Grounds.

The program started at 11am with a word of Prayer from Germaine Laval, a young leader from Nairobi. The welcome remarks were done by the Girl Guide County Commissioner Madam Irene Mwangi. She acknowledged the presence of all the Guests present and thanked them for taking time to join in the celebrations. In her remarks she introduced the Sub County Girl Guide commissioners present and noted that the only part of Nyeri County that did not have Guiding was Tetu but however indicated that the team was working on ensuring that they identify a guider who can work in supporting the implementation of Guide activities in the area.

The former Chief Commissioner Mrs. Wamuyu Mahinda was then invited to give brief remarks. In her remarks she indicated that she is proud of the work that is still going on with Girl Guiding. She encouraged the girls who were present to believe in themselves and always work hard to achieve their dreams. She assured the girls that they have the same potential as boys and they only need to work a little smarter to achieve their dreams.

The National Executive Officer (NEO) Priscilla Gathiga was invited to share her remarks before inviting the Chief Commissioner. In her remarks she shared a brief of the plans that KGGA had ahead of the Centenary Celebrations and invited all the members present for the celebrations. She noted that it was necessary for the Association's National Council members to travel to Nyeri to celebrate the founders before marking the 100th year milestone.

The NEO then invited the Sub County Director of Education Nyeri Central who thanked the Association for inviting him for the commemoration and assured the County Girl Guide Commissioners of the County Director of Education unwavering support for their Guide activities.

The NEO was then honored with the task of introducing the Chief Commissioner, Prof. Faith Nguru.

The KGGA chief commissioner recognized the presence of one of the oldest Guides who interacted with World Chief Guide Mrs. Epharus Mbau. She further stated that achieving this milestone was a new challenge in ensuring that KGGA achieves its set goals and sets the foundation in ensuring that the next 100 years will be a success.

The remarks from KGGA Chief Commissioner Prof Faith Nguru marked the end of the commemoration and with song and Jubilation, the Girl Guides lead the procession to the graveyard carrying bouquets of flowers.

At the graveside, 3 wreaths were laid by the Chief Commissioner, former Chief Commissioner Mrs. Wamuyu and The NEO. The invited Guests assisted by the Girl Guides laid the second wreath. National Executive Members and Young Leaders laid the third wreath.



The procession was then led back to the Baden Powell grounds where two ceremonial trees were planted to commemorate the day. Two signs were erected next to the trees to indicate that they were planted in commemoration of KGGA at 100 Years.



The procession then left the Baden Powell Grounds to Outspan Hotel where the curator of the Hotel took the visitors through a brief history of the life and times of Lord and Lady Baden Powel at Paxtu. The museum holds relics that have been donated by Girl Guides and Scouts around the World.

The curator noted that the Covid-19 impact had hit the Outspan hotel and therefore the hotel was being sold. He noted that this should be a cause of worry to the Girl Guide and Scout Associations since the new owners of the hotel may decide to do away with the museum which will be a huge loss to Kenya as the final resting home of the founders.

The KGGA Chief Commissioner autographed the KGGA @100 scarf and gave it to the curator as KGGA's Gift to the museum.

The WTD celebrations also involved a media conversation through a press briefing from the different reporters based in Nyeri. The reporters were from KTN, NTV, Royal Media Services and Media Max. They interviewed the KGGA Chief Commissioner Prof. Faith Nguru, Executive Committee Member Ann Sumbeiywo and Former Chief Commissioner Mrs. Wamuyu Mahinda.

SPEECH OF THE KGGA CHIEF COMMISSIONER PROFESSOR FAITH NGURU



Today's celebration is very special because in addition to our annual thinking day, we have the privilege and honor to mark 100 years as KGGA.

It is a great joy and honor to be able to look back at the distance we have come as we celebrate the numerous strides we have made in our country, the region and across the globe.

We take pride in belonging to a global movement whose membership transcends barriers across race, class, culture, and religion. We seek to empower girls and women to make their world better

It is our commitment that the girls and women in our network continue to stand out as beacons of integrity, nurturing and championing social values. To this end, the association continues to create safe spaces, opportunities and the right environment for our girls and young women to awaken their fullest potential as leaders and citizens of the world.

We are aware of the unique challenges that our girls and young women face as they endeavor to learn, earn and deliver positive change in their communities.

Our efforts with your continued support will help us to rewrite the narrative of their journey. From victimized and vulnerable individuals to powerful and purposeful. From exploited and endangered to educated and empowered.

Our various programs for learning, training and mentorship are aimed at steadily and consistently closing the opportunity gaps that exist in society while increasing their odds for success.

On our thinking day in 2018 we launched a detailed and ambitious 10year strategic plan to spur KGGA forward. We are glad to confirm that we are on course in its implementation. Noteworthy is our progress in recruitment. We launched an aggressive recruitment drive in the Rift Valley in 2021 that has seen the membership in this period grow by an impressive 50% to the current 350,000 girls. We intend to scale this strategy to other regions as we work towards 1,000,000 members in the next two years.

We note that the KRA recently imposed VAT on the guide uniforms making them more expensive, yet they are compulsory for any girl joining the movement. We again appeal to the Government to declare the girl guides uniforms zero- rated.

In the build up to our big day today, our centenary celebrations have been guided by the very compelling and challenging theme of AWAKENING HER POTENTIAL.

We have made strategic and intentional efforts in this regard, anchored on our five thematic areas: Education, Entrepreneurship, Environment, Peace and Health.

Our various programmes on leadership development, advocacy and Community Action empowers our girls to develop the skills and confidence to drive positive and meaningful change. This is HER, the future leader.

With the support of various sponsors and partners, KGGA continues to deliver entrepreneurship and life skills training, mentorship and linkage to finance in order to elevate the girl's role as HER, the entrepreneur

Our "one girl one tree" campaign aimed at planting over 1Million trees is one of our key initiatives. Together with other partners of environmental conservation, she is exemplified as HER, the green ambassador.

Further, our targeted peace education activities equip our girls to promote conflict resolution and harmonious coexistence and fulfill her role as HER, the peacemaker.

In recognition of blood as the basic unit of life, The Kenya Girl Guides association is running the KGGA @100 Countrywide blood donation drive targeting 100,000 blood Units, demonstrating the understanding of her role as HER, the life giver.

Today, 17 years later, I am 30 and the President of Kenya is my boss. Do you see why it is so important for you girls to believe in yourselves? Work hard, believe in yourself and keep the spirit high. Ignore anyone who tells you that you're a girl or you come from a region that is impossible to be who you are. Instead, fix your smile, be disciplined and work hard.

I was not an A student but I can tell you for a fact I had a gift. As the Reverend shared earlier, God gives every woman or every human being a gift. My gift is speaking. I articulate things very well and I also write. Last year, on December 13th, I published my book called "Of Dreams and Whatever." It is a book about me, the girl child who grew up in a marginalized community from the coast and how I didn't let that stop me.

In the book I talk about being confident, I talk about growing up in a family where girls only seem to finish high school and get married and I talk about the importance of having mentorship.

The guiding fraternity is the best mentorship you can have. Please know you can do all that and still look very fabulous. Whatever you do in life, whoever you meet in life, whatever struggle or challenge you have in life, make sure you always look at the better side of that particular challenge. Do not forget God.







RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Digitization There is need to digitize the material at KGGA, especially the photos and videos. This will help in the retrieval of information when need arises.
- 2. Data base KGGA is a large family with members still active in the association even after serving their terms. Maintaining up to date records would fast track correspondence.

This can happen on a continuous basis.

- 3. In cases of a major event, sending of letters and communication takes approximately 2 weeks. This is sometimes delayed because of approvals by the guests. Drafting can start earlier before the approvals so it only remains filling out the dates and venue details once approval has happened.
- 4. There needs to be continued aggressive social media and digital engagement especially in the communication pursuit with the younger members of the movement
- 5. KGGA does shorter videos that will enhance and add more value to the bigger story of the 100 years, especially with those who never got an opportunity to feature in the Documentary, the videos can be uploaded on social media and on the website.


